COVID-19 Booster Dose Eligibility Now Expanded to Everyone 12 Years and Older

Yakima, WA- On Wednesday, January 5, 2022, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) expanded its COVID-19 vaccine booster dose eligibility to include everyone 12 years and older. Previously, only individuals 16 and older were eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine booster dose. Starting today, January 10, 2022, the Yakima Health District mobile vaccine teams will begin administering Pfizer COVID-19 booster doses to everyone 12 years and older.

It is recommended that everyone 12 and older get a booster dose at least:

- Five months after completing the Pfizer primary vaccination series,
- Six months after completing the Moderna primary vaccination series, or
- Two months after receiving the single-dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine.

However, Pfizer is currently the only COVID-19 vaccine authorized for people ages 17 and younger.

As part of its updated guidance, the CDC recommends that all individuals who received the Pfizer vaccine as their primary series get a booster dose 5 months after completing their vaccination series. Previously, the recommendation was to receive a booster dose 6 months after completing the initial Pfizer primary series. Boosters can be mixed and matched, which means adults can choose which vaccine they would like to receive as a booster dose.
